Dear Governor Schwarzenegger:

I urge you to sign Assembly Bill 1108, legislation that would restrict the use of phthalates in toys and other products for children. This bill presents California with the opportunity to be a national leader in the protection of children's health.

Phthalates leach out of toys, teething rings, and other many products and into the mouths of children. As all parents know, young children will place just about anything in their mouths.

The potential consequences are serious, as a growing body of scientific evidence links phthalates to serious health conditions, including reproductive and genital defects, premature birth, and the early onset of puberty. Additional animal research links phthalates to prostate, breast, and testicular cancers. Earlier this year, over 200 scientists at the International Conference on Fetal Programming and Development Toxicity called for policymakers to focus on the danger posed by phthalates and other chemicals.

This emerging research led the European Union to ban phthalates in toys and childcare articles, on the principle that products not known to be safe for children should not be in use. We should do the same. The United States risks becoming a dumping ground for phthalate filled toys that can no longer be legally sold overseas. I understand that you are being heavily lobbied by toy manufacturers and the chemical industry. But the health and safety of children, especially infants, should be foremost in any evaluation of this bill.

I urge you to sign AB 1108 into law, and I look forward to continuing to work with you to promote the health and safety of all Californians.

Dear Governor Schwarzenegger:

The American Cancer Society, California Division writes to request your signature on AB 1108 (Ma). This bill would ensure that toddlers are not exposed to phthalates by prohibiting the production and sale of toys intended for children three and under in California if they have phthalate concentrations of more than one-tenth of one percent.

For the American Cancer Society, the policy question centers on the potential to abate cancer risk by reducing exposure of our children to phthalates. While the science is not conclusive on this issue, we believe that the population in question, children, warrant special consideration. There is evidence that phthalates are a carcinogen in laboratory animals and that the effects are greater on young and developing animals. Further, the National Toxicology Program has classified one phthalate (DEHP) as reasonably anticipated to be a human carcinogen, and several phthalates—DEHF, BBP, DBP, DnHP - are already on the state's Prop. 65 list of substances known to the state to cause cancer or reproductive toxicity.

Additionally, the bill deals with toys intended for use by children three and under. These little people frequently put toys in their mouths. Given that phthalates are readily absorbed, a child's exposure to these questionable substances is certain when the chemical is used in those toys.

With the growing body of evidence questioning the safety of phthalates and because we believe there is reason to be more cautious about potential carcinogen exposures with the very young, we think AB 1108 is a reasonable and common-sense bill.

For example, phthalates, used in a variety of children's products including soft plastic toys and teethers, have been linked to developmental problems, such as premature breast development in garls, male genital defects, and reduced spenn quality. Emerging research on phthalates has shown that these chemicals, even in extremely low doses, contribute significantly to increased breast cancer risk.

Phthalates are known to disrupt the endocrine system. Since a woman's lifetime risk of breast cancer is directly related to the amount of estrogen she is exposed to, any chemical that can mimic estrogen is of particular concern to us. Any chemical that is known to be estrogenic does not belong, in any amount, in our children's toys or feeding products.

For many chemicals, including phthalates alternatives exist. Some major manufacturers have already taken the responsible path toward eliminating these hazards from their products. Yet, there currently are no laws in the U.S. prohibiting the use of these chemicals, and no way for parents to know whether the products they buy will help—or hinder—their child's development.

AB 1108 would prohibit the manufacture, sale, and distribution of children's products that contain phthalates. By climinating unnecessary exposure to phthalates in children's products, California will again be a leader in protecting children from unnecessary toxic exposure

Dear Governor Schwarzenegger:

The 75,000 Registered Nurses of the California Nurses Association supports AB 1108 (Ma) which would prohibit the manufacture, sale and distribution of children's products that contain phthalates by January 1, 2009.

Phthalates are used to prolong the durability of plastics and increase the flexibility of some plastics, and have been used as solvents for other materials. They are used in hundreds of products, including vinyl flooring, adhesives, detergents, lubricating oils, some pharmaceutical and pesticide formulations, and personal-care products.

It is of great concern to CNA that these phthalates are used in products that children use on a daily basis such as toys, pacifiers and feeding products. These chemicals have been linked to genetic defects such as Down's syndrome, early onset puberty, abnormal growth, hyperactivity, premature breast development in girls and male genital defects.

Major industries have taken steps toward eliminating these harmful agents in products. Disney and Mattel no longer use phthalates in mouthing products for children and Evenflo, First Years, and Gerber stopped using phthalates in all of their toys and childcare products. San Francisco County passed an ordinance prohibiting the manufacture, sale or distribution of toys or child care articles intended for use by a child under three years of age if the product contains bisphenol-A and phthalates. Several countries have adopted similar bans.

Currently, there are two states considering a similar ban on phthalates. California should be leading the nation on this important health and safety issue for our children.

AB 1108 bans the use of six types of phthalates in toys. Phthalates are a family of chemicals that are put into plastic products, including toys, teething rings and rattles, to make them soft and pliable. Yet phthalates pose a particular health risk to infants and young children. Kids' curiosity and natural tendencies to explore the world around them by putting objects in their mouths virtually guarantee exposure to phthalates. But their bodies are less able to detoxity themselves. And as their organs develop, they pass through windows of vulnerability when even tiny doses of these toxic chemicals can have extra-harmful effects.

One scientific study after another has shown that minuscule doses of phthalates, doses that previously were assumed safe, can disrupt the hormonal balance of developing children, potentially causing serious, lifelong effects. Researchers have linked phthalates to early puberty in girls, reproductive problems, abnormalities of the penis, impaired sperm, liver and thyroid damage and testicular cancer. In fact, California has put several types of phthalates on its list of reproductive and developmental toxicants that, under certain conditions, require consumer warnings.

The timing of the exposure to these chemicals during early stages of development matters as much, if not more, than the dose. Unfortunately, a 2005 study by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention showed nearly all children already have unhealthy levels of phthalates in their bodies. The good news is that there are safe, economical replacements for phthalates.

The European Union and 14 other countries have banned or restricted the use of phthalates in children's products. In the U.S., several leading toy manufacturers also have restricted their use of phthalates over the last few years as a result of research confirming health concerns. However, the vast majority of children's products available in the U.S. still contain phthalates. With available alternatives, toy companies are unnecessarily exposing children to toxic chemicals. AB 1108 would change this—California leading the nation toward the advancement of green chemistry and a healthier society.

This letter signals our support for AB 1108 (Ma), which awaits action on your desk. The bill will protect Californian children from toxic exposures to phthalate chemicals in toys.

Phthalates, like many chemicals in commerce, have insufficient health and safety data, which should be required before any chemical is approved for use. Nevertheless, the scientific and medical research now clearly shows that phthalates are potentially harmful reproductive toxicants. Children, especially baby boys, should not be chewing on plastic toys or teething rings which contain these chemicals.

Researchers have linked phthalates to early puberty in girls, reproductive problems, abnormalities of the penis, impaired sperm, liver and thyroid damage and testicular cancer. In fact, California has put several types of phthalates on its list of reproductive and developmental toxicants that, under certain conditions, require consumer warnings.

The timing of the exposure to these chemicals during early stages of development matters as much, if not more, than the dose. Unfortunately, a 2005 study by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention showed nearly all children already have unhealthy levels of phthalates in their bodies. The good news is that there are safe, economical replacements for phthalates.

The European Union and 14 other countries have banned or restricted the use of

phthalates in children's products. In the U.S., several leading toy manufacturers also have restricted their use of phthalates over the last few years as a result of research confirming health concerns. However, the vast majority of children's products available in the U.S. still contain phthalates.

With available alternatives, toy companies are unnecessarily exposing children to toxic chemicals. AB 1108 would change this—California leading the nation toward the advancement of green chemistry and a healthier society.

Please support AB 1108 and sign it into law.

On behalf of NRDC (Natural Resources Defense Council), which has 1.2 million members and activists, 250,000 of whom are Californians, we are writing to request your signature on AB 1108 by Assembly Member Ma. This bill would protect children from endocrine disrupting chemicals in toys and child care products.

Extensive scientific evidence now exists that phthalates may pose risks to children and they have been linked to developmental alterations, especially of the testis and male reproductive system.

For many chemicals, including phthalates, alternatives exist and some major manufacturers have already taken the responsible path toward eliminating these hazards from their products. Yet currently, there are no laws in the U.S. prohibiting the use of phthalates, and no way for parents to know whether the products they buy may help—or hinder—their child's development.

AB 1108 would prohibit the manufacture, saw and distribution of children's toys and child care products that contain phthalates. By eliminating unnecessary exposure to these chemicals in children's products, California will follow the lead of the City of San Francisco, and will be the first state in the nation to protect children from these chemicals.

Dear Governor Schwarzenegger:

The California League of Conservation Voters (CLCV) and the National Environmental Trust (NET) strongly support AB 1108 (Ma), which will prohibit the use in children's toys and feeding items of specified phthalates, a class of synthetic chemicals that are commonly found in humans at levels above those known to cause adverse health effects. We urge you to sign this important measure into law.

Phthalates are just one of the "poster children" for the U.S.'s completely failed chemicals policy. More than 80,000 chemicals are used in commerce in the U.S., yet public health experts and the public know very little about their potential health effects. And the federal Toxic Substances Control Act (TSCA) is designed to make sure we never do. Like virtually the entire volume of chemicals in use today, phthalates were grandfathered when TSCA was adopted in 1979; ISCA makes it all but impossible to regulate, much less ban, these old chemicals. And unlike other areas of environmental law, where California often adopts stricter rules than the federal government, California has no law designed to comprehensively identify and regulate dangerous chemicals.

So when the manufacturers and users of phthalates claim there is no evidence of harm from their products, those claims should not be reassuring, since there is no regulatory structure to confirm or refute such claims. In the absence of a viable federal or state law to identify and restrict exposure to dangerous chemicals, the National Toxicology Program has reviewed the scientific literature on phthalates and found that all six phthalates regulated by AB 1108 pose reproductive or developmental risks to humans, especially infants, children and pregnant and lactating women.

A 2003 survey of human chemical contamination by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), still the largest ever done, found phthalates in every person tested and the highest levels in children and women of reproductive age. Adverse effects of exposure to phthalates include early puberty onset in girls (early puberty onset has recently been linked to a higher incidence of breast caner later in life); premature birth; impaired sperm quality and sperm damage in men; genital defects; reduced testosterone production in boys; and testicular cancer.

In June 2005, Scientific American published a feature article titled "DOUBT is Their Product." It is worth quoting extensively from the article, since it goes to the heart of the problem being addressed by AB 1108:

Few scientific challenges are more complex than understanding the health risks of a chemical or drug. Investigators cannot feed toxic compounds to people to see what doses cause cancer. Instead laboratory researchers rely on animal tests, and epidemiologists examine the human exposures that have already happened in the field. Both types of studies have many uncertainties, and scientists must extrapolate from the evidence to make causal inferences and recommend protective measures. Because absolute certainty is rarely an option, regulatory programs would not be effective if such proof were required. Government officials have to use the best available evidence to set limits for harmful chemicals and determine the safety of pharmaceuticals.

Uncertainty is an inherent problem of science, but manufactured uncertainty is another matter entirely. Over the past three decades, industry groups have frequently become involved in the investigative process when their interests are threatened. If, for example, studies show that a company is exposing its workers to dangerous levels of a certain chemical, the business typically responds by hiring its own researchers to cast doubt on the studies. Or if a pharmaceutical firm faces questions about the safety of one of its drugs, its executives trumpet company-sponsored trials that show no significant health risks while ignoring or hiding other studies that are much less reassuring. The vilification of threatening research as "junk science" and the corresponding sanctification of industrycommissioned research as "sound science" has become nothing less than standard operating procedure in some parts of corporate America.

The same industry that has spent the last 30 years making sure that TSCA is toothless is now selling doubt as sound science. Meanwhile the public, including the most vulnerable among us like infants and children, continue to be exposed to chemicals on a regular basis at levels that independent studies show cause harm. Certainty is a misguided and impossible goal; careful consideration of the preponderance of evidence in defense of public health should be the goal of the committee.

Until California or the federal government establishes a credible regulatory and oversight program to identify and mitigate the harmful effects of dangerous chemicals used in commerce, the Legislature will consider to pass bills like AB 1108. There is simply no regulatory recourse by which to deal with dangerous chemicals. For this reason, CLCV and NET strongly support AB 1108 and urge you to sign the bill into law.

Dear Governor Schwarzenegger:

The City and County of San Francisco urges your signature on AB 1108. This bill will support our efforts in San Francisco to ensure that the products sold to young children do not contain harmful chemicals such as phthalates. The Center for Disease Control and Prevention has documented the fact that these chemicals are found in people across the country; at the same time scientists have demonstrated the harmful effects of these chemicals on developing reproductive systems. In the face of inaction at the federal level, it is left to individual cities, like San Francisco, and the State of California to take preventative action to protect the public health of its citizens.

We have found that once parents are made aware of the potentially harmful chemicals now used in products marketed for children, they are outraged and want to make sure they purchase safer alternatives. The problem with chemicals like phthalates is that they are not listed on product labels. Thus there is no way for parents to make an informed purchasing decision. This lack of product labeling means that the only way to help parents avoid these chemicals is to prevent their use in children's products altogether.

In 1999 and again in 2005, the European Union affirmed a ban on phthalates used in children's products. San Francisco recently passed a similar ban on phthalates on products sold in our city.
